Post Finance 101 – Final Budget Item Details

On March 6th (Stewardship Sunday) the Finance Committee held its annual educational, question and answer session on the church budgeting process. The presentation called **Finance 101** was combined with the monthly **What's on Your Mind** session held by the Board of Trustees. Below is some of the information presented and other facts and considerations of the presented budget.

This year's budget is largely influenced by four major items:

1. A 3.3% salary increase for our staff
2. The costs of a settled minister search
3. Hiring a bookkeeping firm
4. Decreased fund raising potential for the coming year.

In the past few weeks E-blast we have provided detailed information about the first three budget items. Today we'll cover the final topic, decreased fund raising potential.

Fundraising projects have been a longstanding tradition at UUCC. For years they have been a prominent part of our annual social agenda, as well as a substantial part of our annual budget. You don't have to think back too many years to remember:

All of these activities brought us closer together as a community while simultaneously supporting the church financially. They were an outgrowth of a vibrant church community with many volunteer hands participating to make them a success and they were fun.

The past two years have taken a significant toll on all of us as individuals as well as on our collective sense of togetherness and community. COVID safety concerns have forced us into our isolated silos and bubbles and we've learned that it's harder to "come together" on Zoom. We have had to adjust our fundraising activities to accommodate the realities of pandemic life. This has meant deferring events that brought people together indoors for preparing or hosting the event, using the web for displaying items for sale at our holiday fair and spring auction and adjusting the pick-up & distribution of purchased items to folks standing at the front door of the church while volunteers brought the goods out to the buyers. Hardly the stuff of joyous, personal communion to which we were accustomed.

Despite the loss of frequent, direct connection, our community rallied to vigorously support the church's fundraising efforts. Last year's Spring Auction nearly reached its goal of \$5000 and as recently as this past autumn, both the Pie Sale and the Holiday Fair exceeded their goals. However, these activities have taken a significant toll on the small number of organizers who labored long and hard to make them a success. The many hands that once came together to plan, organize and implement our fundraisers have become a few hands having to shoulder a heavy lift. The result is that three of our most productive fundraisers have indicated that they are not available to continue these activities during 2022. Our Spring Auction will offer two work crews, but no other items. The Holiday Fair will only happen if new people step forward to organize and run it. The fiscal effect of these losses will be a decrease of more than \$5000 in our budgeted income.

Maintaining the Unitarian Universalist Community Church as a beacon of liberal, religious presence and social justice action is dependent upon each and every one of us stepping forward to keep that light burning. Please join us in devoting your time, energy and financial resources to maintain that presence.

Social Justice Committee: Opportunity to help Ukraine refugees.

Nancy Fritz's son lives in the Czech Republic. There are more than 40,000 Ukraine refugees in the Czech Republic; thousands more are expected. The people of the Czech Republic are opening their homes to as many refugees as they possibly can, including Nancy's son Jeff and daughter-in-law Mel. Jeff is driving a van full of humanitarian supplies to the Ukraine border and bringing Ukrainian refugees back to the Czech Republic.

We have an opportunity to help in this effort by bringing a check made out to Nancy Fritz to the church office. The checks will be collected on Monday (March 14) and deposited into Nancy's account. These funds will be transferred by Nancy to Mel's bank account and will be used to support the refugees in the Czech villages.





COVID-19 Updates / News

Update from COVID-19 Advisory Group

The plan for reopening UUC for in-person, indoor gatherings approved by the Board on August 12, 2021 depends on the COVID-19 pandemic being under control in our state and county. The Board adopted a Maine CDC metric that measures "community (person to person) transmission" of the virus. **The necessary CDC metric for us to reopen is no more than 10 new cases per 10,000 people in Kennebec County or the State of Maine.**



The present CDC metric data indicates that it is still unsafe for us to safely reopen.

Discussions continue around reassessing the re-opening plan approved by the Board in August. The discussions may lead to a changing of the metrics OR to reopening the church. Discussions are continuing at the COVID-19 Advisory group meeting and Board meetings. More information will come. Stay tuned...

Dr. Don on Covid-19

Dr Don on COVID-19 Long Term COVID - One Person's Story

Reporting on the experiences of a UMaine professor, the Bangor Daily News provided us this past Monday a picture of the long term effects of COVID-19 for one individual. After giving a talk at Iowa State University, U M sociology professor Amy Blackstone returned to her hotel room with a tickle in her throat. Blackstone was pretty sure she had the virus, since she'd been traveling around the country giving talks. So she drove to a friend's cabin in the Wisconsin woods and spent two weeks sick and alone in quarantine before returning to her home in Bangor.

But COVID was far from done with her. In the two years since, Blackstone has grappled with an array of symptoms from long COVID, a condition that scientists believe affects up to 50 percent of people contracting the virus. Sometimes it lasts for a few months, for others it can last much longer. Like millions of others with long COVID, Blackstone has experienced debilitating fatigue, headaches, nausea and brain fog on a nearly daily basis. It's upended her life, even as she's among the tens of millions of Americans who have officially recovered from the virus that struck two years ago.

"I spent an afternoon cooking last weekend, and it drained me to the point that I slept for two full days afterwards. And all I did was cook. My tank just empties really quickly" she said. Walking up and downstairs is exhausting. She forgets where she puts household items. She has trouble focusing on reading and writing, or following movie plots. She hasn't experienced lung or heart issues, but headaches can leave her bedridden some days.

Long COVID has caused Blackstone to put her career on hold. She's taken a medical leave from UMaine and said no to opportunities to give lectures, appear on television or podcasts, and write columns for the New York Times and Time Magazine. "My life has been ripped away from me," she said. "I'm just trying to take it one

day at a time.” Blackstone explained her struggle to find doctors in the Bangor area who would take her seriously when she believed she had long COVID. Blackstone said her primary care physician told her she was experiencing concussion symptoms, from bonking her head on a car door around the same time she got COVID.

By the end of 2020, not much had changed. Her doctor and a neurologist both told her that long COVID wasn’t causing her symptoms. The neurologist, she said, outright denied that long COVID was a real thing, and said what Blackstone was experiencing was a mental health issue. “I think, beyond the fact that there’s a documented history of women’s health problems being dismissed by doctors as ‘all in their head,’ there’s also the fact that even now there’s still so much we don’t know about the long-term effects of COVID,” she said.

Frustrated by the fact that, nearly a year later, she wasn’t getting much better, she decided to switch primary care physicians and soon received a referral to a neurologist at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. Blackstone is now making slow progress toward returning to a more normal life. One of the ways Blackstone is working to retrain her brain to focus is by doing puzzles, knitting and learning to cross stitch. “It kind of gets me in this place where the nausea and headaches go away, and I feel really calm and focused,” she said. “And I don’t have to take a pill to do it. I’m so sick of having to take drugs to feel better. I have a great job with amazing benefits. I am lucky to be able to access all kinds of treatment, and afford to stay overnight in a hotel in Boston when I go there,” she said. “But the majority of people don’t have that luxury. What happens to them? How do they get on with their lives?”
