UNITING FOR RACIAL JUSTICE Making Our Way <u>Together</u> To Conscious Engagement.

Racism is pervasive and rising racial tensions are the reality across this nation. We might chose to disengage but we cannot escape. People of color living across the nation need us to stand in solidarity as comrades in the work to dismantle racism in all its insidious, nefarious and sundry forms.

As Unitarian Universalist we are called by our principles and history to close the gap between our values and our actions. This call to stay engaged in racial justice requires of us a willingness to stay tuned in and informed; ready to take risks and make mistakes; and to be called out on our white privilege that we might do better.

I invite you to join me throughout the year as we humbly show up and boldly engage with acts of love for a more just society. As I said in my September 20th sermon, I don't care if you take baby steps or ginormous steps, I ask only that you join me in *Staying Woke* and staying engaged. I ask only that we join together in the journey of showing up alongside the people of color and their leaders to be ally's in this work for racial equality. Where, when and how you chose to stay informed and be engaged is both personal and individual.

As your minister, I will commit to supporting your personal engagement by ensuring two opportunities are presented each month. First, I will write a monthly column in The *Flaming Chalice*. This column titled **Uniting for Racial Justice** will announce a monthly opportunity to *stay woke and stay engaged*. Second, the monthly Soul Matters Packet will include theme related spiritual exercises, readings or questions for your small group ministry sessions or for you to reflect on privately at your own pace. If you chose to engage in private reflection, I encourage you to find one trusted person to share your stories, experiences and awakenings in the journey toward being a racial justice ally. From Seminarian Claire Curole....

To my church family:

I have been promising an update for a long while now and as I sit down to write this, it is surprisingly difficult to know where to begin. As many of you know, my journey toward ministry took a wide detour last year when I deferred internship and dropped to part-time study to tend to some unexpected personal issues that came up. I am now halfway through my MDiv coursework, with at least three years until I graduate. I am taking the last of my academic intensive classes this year and hope to begin my two-year half-time internship next fall, but that could change again.

Perhaps I have avoided writing because so many things are uncertain. I would very much like to tell you exactly how this story is going to go, but I don't know yet. This growth business is messy and complicated with a lot of pieces that are not entirely in or are entirely out of - my control. I am beginning to realize that this is how most of our stories are: complex, interconnected, with a lot of loose ends and unexpected turns.

I definitely did not expect this year's sudden restructuring of the UUA's ministerial credentialing requirements. This spring the UUA Board of Trustees passed a budget which removed funding for the Regional Sub-Committees on Candidacy (RSCC), eliminating the interviews by which students aspiring to ministry had been granted Candidate status - institutional recognition as ministers-in-formation. This would have been my next step; I had been scheduled for an interview later this year. The credentialing office has since issued revised candi-

dacy requirements for those of us currently in process.

There has long been a requirement that those seeking ministerial fellowship have the sponsorship of a UU congregation. To quote from the UUA website, "At the most basic level, congregational sponsorship indicates confidence in the candidate's potential and suitability for UU ministry. The MFC regards sponsorship as evidence that the candidate is actively committed to the Purposes and Principles of the UUA and the institutions which uphold them." This year's revisions have moved this requirement from the end of the process to the beginning, and those of us in mid-stream were asked to seek sponsorship, among other requirements, in order to proceed.

I want to thank this church community for sponsoring me, by vote of the Board of Trustees, as a candidate for ministry. I am pleased - and a bit awed - to announce that I have been granted Candidate status by the Ministerial Credentialing Office of the UUA. This is a milestone, one of many. I am nowhere near finished, and I am grateful to have you all with me on the journey. Thank you.

President's Column....

On Saturday, September 12, the leadership team of the church got together for the annual Leadership Retreat. We revisited the congregational goals that the congregation adopted two springs ago, and that were the focus of our work all last year. The four goals were stated as aspirations:

(Sustainability) "We are a congregation where the sustainability of the congregations' time, talent, and treasure are intentionally balanced within the spectrum of church activities, faith formation.

worship, and governance."

(Inspiring and Engaging) "We are a People of Faith who intentionally, courageously, and creatively engage our membership and our community. We seek to inspire and be inspired." (Interconnectedness) "We are an interconnected community committed to age diversity and family ministry."

(Communication) "We are a congregation that is transparent in its decisions and actions. We strive for communication that is abundant, clear, compassionate, and inclusive."

All four of these are important, but as a group we decided to prioritize the fourth of these goals: being transparent in decisions and actions, and striving for communication that is abundant, clear, compassionate, and inclusive. The leadership had been working on communication last year, also, but there's more work to do.

The idea isn't *adequate communication*, but *radical engagement* with the church, which sounds big. But it also involves *assuming best intentions*, being willing to be vulnerable, and tending to the vulnerability of each other.

This can be hard. On the one hand we, as a church, have a representative governance structure. In a way, the membership committee volunteers to handle membership stuff so that we – as a whole congregation – don't have to. The board is charged with putting together the budget, but the whole congregation needs to be a part of that conversation. On the other hand, the nature of our work and our community is that we all share in the work and responsibility of each.

We are many *and* we are one. It's tricky, for sure. I stumbled a few times last year. All the more reason to try harder – or try smarter, more intentionally. Community happens one conversation at a time. Come join the conversation.
