A Faith Journey...

We worship, learn, and minister together, embracing diversity and religious freedom. ~ UUCC Mission ~

There has been a lot of talk lately about shared ministry. What does that mean? How do we manifest this spirit in all that we do? How do you take up the mantle and live it in your days?

Shared ministry is the idea that all people are called to share their gifts and talents, resources and time to serve together in the spirit of mutuality and partnership. In Unitarian Universalist communities we celebrate our interdependence with a cooperative model of leading and living the grace of love in action. In Unitarian Universalism we understand our call to serve the community to be expansive; stretching beyond our walls, our beliefs, our borders, our nations, our politics, and beyond a myriad of identities —race, class, sexual orientation, gender, ability and age.

We believe ministry is not the solo act of an ordained minister but rather the work of the whole community. As such, ministry happens wherever and whenever members and friends engage in ways that serve the mission and vision of their congregation. In shared ministry our call to grow souls and serve the good in the world is a collective manifestation and celebration of Life, Love and the Holy.

With shared ministry no single person holds responsibility for our ministry. As Brigid said one Sunday, (I'm paraphrasing here) "No one person is responsible for the success of our religious exploration program. Not the minister. Not the staff. Not the Religious Exploration Committee. We all hold responsibility for the success and failure of our ministries." Our governance structure charges individuals (minister, staff and membership), working groups, committees and governing bodies with specific work to be completed within the community. Implicit in this charge is the expectation that ministry is always carried out in conversation with the membership, and for the well being of the organization and society at large.

My week as minister-in-residence with the Bismarck-Mandan Unitarian Universalist Congregation is a fine example of how our shared ministry serves a sister congregation, the wider Unitarian Universalist movement and the vision of the water protectors at Standing Rock, ND.

Our upcoming religious exploration retreat is a poignant call for the membership to engage in the future of our children and youth. It will take all of us to imagine a religious exploration program that meets the needs of twenty-first century families. Raising a family today is vastly different than it was 25 years ago or even 10 years ago. This retreat will celebrate the strengths of our program as we creatively explore the spiritual development needs of children youth and their families. And we will do this with our children and youth deeply engaged in the process. For they are a part of our shared ministry and know best what will draw them into a dynamic engagement of moral and spiritual development.

There is a multitude of ways this community embodies shared ministry. As you move through this month I invite you to take a risk and engage in a piece of our shared ministry that stretches you out of your comfort zone and shares your gifts and talents in new and bold ways.

With the depth of the snow right now, it seems difficult to imagine spring, but we know it really is coming! The renewal of the earth, the sprouting up of bulbs, and the beginning of greening of the trees are such positive signs that life will continue and is renewed after the resting of winter. As you look toward the first day of spring do you have a spiritual practice you are thinking of establishing, something new or different to begin with the new season? Religious Exploration...

Dear Families,

You've been hearing a lot of talk about what an exciting period we're entering for Religious Exploration: a period of revisioning, of reimagining and redefining, of hope. RE has been and done so many things this year already. As of the end of February, we have learned about how to handle bullying, how to fight hunger by collecting food and donations, how to fight poverty by providing necessary items to shelters, how to fight slavery by making conscious decisions about our lifestyles, and how to fight sickness by supporting great non-profits like Make-A-Wish Maine. It's been an astonishing year!

Think shooting stars and rocket ships and bold flowers growing from deeply immersed roots. If RE is a garden, and our children are the flowers, vegetables, fruits, and leafy green wees, then the church is the fertile soil in which the seeds take root. This is what we mean when we speak of shared ministry: plants will grow everywhere if we give them the sun and the water, if we "warm them from below." And with time, and care, the flowers, vegetables, fruits, will grow strong to contribute to the beauty and nourishment of this world.

Planting a garden is an act of love, and faith, and hope. We love our children, and this is why we help them in their spiritual journey, why we bring them to church, and teach them our values. We have faith that our work will be worth it, we have faith in our children's abilities, we have faith that the seeds we plant will take root and become plants. And here is what I always remember when I see our children and their eagerness to repair the world: children are our hope for the future. This is so important in the world we belong to now-we hold our children now, and they will turn around one day and hold us, and the world, in their compassionate arms, in the garden of hope.


